A Hero:

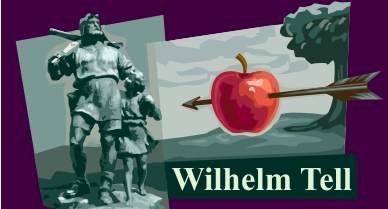
- ❖ A person decides to do their best
 - ❖ He/she battles fears and develops self-confidence
 - ❖ The person completes a great task that helps others
 - ❖ The person becomes a positive example to others
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- ❖ **Legends are often about real people who dared to live their lives courageously.**
We can learn how to write our own *life* stories by knowing theirs. Legends are about real people. Over time people exaggerated aspects of the story.
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- ❖ **Tall Tales** exaggerate the stories of real or fictional people to the point of absolute impossibility.
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- ❖ **Myths are stories that explain something.**
Myths usually involve supernatural creatures or talking animals. Many myths come from ancient Greece such as Zeus and Pan.
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- ❖ **Fables are stories that are told to teach a lesson.**
Fables include talking animals.
